

The Garden of Remembrance Welcomes Two New Congregations



The Memorial Park expands with the development of Phase III.

The Garden of Remembrance (Gan Zikaron) welcomes B'nai Israel and Chabad Lubavitch of Upper Montgomery County as its newest participating congregations, increasing the number of those with sections to fifteen.

With B'nai Israel's purchase of cemetery property in Phase III, development of the land between the entrance gates and the crest of the hill will soon begin. This phase will include burial plots for members of participating congregations, those of other congregations, and people unaffiliated with a congregation.

Phase III will also feature a limited number of Forest Glade sections. Ideal for families, these 20-plot sections are nestled in private areas among the natural woodland and beautiful, well-manicured grounds.

The memorial park's other new participating congregation, Chabad Lubavitch of Upper Montgomery County, joins three other Orthodox congregations that have selected the Garden of Remembrance as the place to bury and honor the memory of departed members.

The fifteen participating congregations—Orthodox, Conservative, Reform and Reconstructionist—make this the area's most inclusive cemetery. And with the future construction and completion of the Lebbin Family Chapel, families will be able to choose to hold burial services in the chapel, in the gazebo, or at graveside.
